
May our successes and achievements in the past years inspire us further to maintain the quality and level of our service and commitment, that is, to serve the public with utmost dedication and integrity.








"QUALITY OF OVERALL INFRASTRUCTURE RANKING"




"QUALITY OF ROADS"

"2010-2011"









The 31,242 kms (15,872 kms-National Arterial Road, 15,370 kms-National Secondary Road) total length of national road network based on 2010 Road Condition Data is targeted to be 100% paved by 2016, however this excludes newly converted national roads and constructed gap sections along predetermined road alignment in 2011 and succeeding years. Moreover, the desired outcomes can be attained if the needed

funding support will be provided.

National Arterial Road




National Secondary Road


The 15,872 kms national arterial road is targeted to be 100% paved by 2014 while, the 15,370 kms national secondary road is targeted to be 100% paved by 2016. Also, DPWH is targeting to make permanent all temporary bridges along national roads by 2016.

National Bridges




PUBLIC INVESTMENT PROGRAM (2010-2016):

Under the DPWH Public Investment Program for 2011 to 2016, DPWH is envisaging a total investment of P698 Billion. Of the P698 Billion total investment requirement, P545 Billion (78%) is earmarked for the highways sector, P77 Billion (11%) for flood control works and P76 Billion (11%) for other projects, as shown below:



Note: The amount reflected under the FY 2010, FY 2011 and FY 2012 are Capital Outlays (Projects) based on GAA, while for the FY 2013 and succeeding years DPWH is envisaging a 10% increase in Budget annually. The FY 2010 Budget includes P25.971 Billion for VIILP/PDAF.



GOOD GOVERNANCE REFORM AND ANTI-CORRUPTION PROGRAM:

- Objective selection of road projects using the Highway Development Management Program (HDM4) not on political interventions;
- Updated projects status are available on the DPWH Website;
- Simplified bidding process from 20 to 5 documents;
- Adopted a reduced cost structure in project budgets reduced by as much as 8% Indirect Cost of projects;

Revised Cost Structure:

Indirect Cost of projects has been slashed by as much as 8% of project cost estimates used in the past, as shown below:

By adopting the new cost structure, we will optimize use of government resources. This will also speed up in the future preparation of POWs and ABCs as the benchmarks are already standardized. The new cost structure will also be adapted to MVUC projects.

- 24/7 DPWH Call Center (165-02) to address queries and complaints;
- Enhance Information Technology (IT) in public disclosure and project implementation (Electronic New Government Accounting System, eNGAS)
- Revised Level of Authority:

As for the bidding and implementation of projects costing P50 Million and below, these will be implemented by the District Engineering Offices. Projects costing above P50 Million up to P150 Million will be implemented by the Regional Office but the engineering designs, programs of works and detailed cost estimates are reviewed and approved in the Central Office to ensure quality and strict conformance to the design standards and the new cost structure.

- Proper utilization and objective selection/prioritization of Motor Vehicle Users Charge (MVUC) Funds;
- Accreditation of 47 Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) partners in all aspects of project development cycle;
- Professionalize the Organization through open selection and promotion policies;
- Collusion in the bidding of public works projects is being addressed through transparency reforms and strict adherence to public bidding rules. As the result of these reforms, the DPWH generated savings of P5.533 billion in taxpayers' money from the 5,197 projects (civil works, goods, consultancy services) procured through open, competitive, and transparent bidding nationwide July 2010 to November 2011. The DPWH expects total savings of roughly P6 to P7 billion by the end of this year due to more transparent and competitive bidding. This savings can then be utilized for other priority development projects.

Clustering of FY 2011 Projects:

Locally funded projects (Region/District Implemented) under the FY 2011 Budget were clustered based on the following guidelines:

- Sub-sections with gaps of not more than 3 km but with a total allocation of P20 Million and above can be clustered.
- If the cluster has a total allocation of less than P20 Million, then the next sub-sections can be added to the cluster provided that the gap is not more than 10 km to produce a combined allocation of P20 Million and above.
- If the gap between sub-sections is more than 10km, the sub section can be treated as a stand-alone project regardless of the allocation.



UPGRADE QUALITY AND SAFETY OF NATIONAL ROADS:

- Adopted new standards for concrete pavement thickness from 230mm to 280mm;
- Outsourcing project inspection and quality assurance of DPWH projects;
- Developing new construction design standards and specifications upgrade drainage specifications, slope protection & soil erosion control, widening of national arterial road;
- Construct loading and unloading bays for road safety;
- Improve road safety using Traffic Accident Recording and Analysis System (TARAS) and International Road Assessment Program (iRAP);
- Enforcement of anti-overloading provision of the law.

TOURISM CONVERGENCE PROGRAM:

One of the priorities of the Department that would have a clear social outcome based on prudent and efficient selection of projects with measurable social and economic benefits is to enhance major thoroughfares to improve traffic and safety standards in urban centers and tourist destinations.

An amount of P1.800 Billion is included in the DPWH FY 2011 Budget for the rehabilitation/improvement/ upgrading of national roads to declared tourist destinations. Moreover, an amount of P4.080 Billion is included in the DPWH FY 2012 Budget for infrastructure projects (access to Strategic Tourism Destinations, Major Airports and RoRo Ports) in support to tourism industry of the country. However, these projects were not conceptualized/prioritized based on the Department of Tourism (DOT) Master Plan considering it was not yet available during the formulation of the DPWH FY 2012 Budget.

DPWH and DOT are working on a Convergence Program to prioritize selected tourism road projects based on criteria for the preparation of the FY 2013/succeeding budgets of the Department.

WATER CONVERGENCE PROGRAM:

DPWH is closely coordinating with other national government agencies relative to the convergence programs which are supportive of the government's plans of accelerating infrastructure development towards the realization of the inclusive growth vision. DPWH has a water convergence program with Department of Agriculture (DA), Department of Agrarian Reform (DAR) and the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) and this concerns the management of the river systems.

DPWH recognizes that the flood control structures downstream will not be freely effective if the watershed management upstream is lacking. The synchronized implementation of water resource development and management projects in a river basin is crucial to attain optimum benefits and impacts from the combined effects of a mixture of projects.

An amount of P725.4 Million under the FY 2011 Budget was already released for the flood control convergence projects with DA, DAR and DENR. When completed, flooding within the influence areas of the projects will be mitigated/reduced.

DPWH Policies on Flood Control:

- Upgrade drainage facilities especially in highly urbanized areas;
- Promote innovative technologies such as geotextiles and coco-netting in slope protection and soil erosion control;
- Promote rainwater harvesting and retarding basins;
- Support other agencies' efforts in non-structural measures such as hazard mapping (DOST/DENR), proper garbage collection and disposal (MMDA), relocation of informal settlers living along rivers/creeks, and estero/creek cleaning (MMDA/LGUs);
- Institutional capacity building.


DPWH ANNUAL REPORT 2011

In FY 2011, a total of P20.957 Billion or 26.6% of the total investment nationwide has been allocated/ released for Mindanao to help its infrastructure development and economic growth. The P20.957 Billion already includes the P2.851 Billion investment support program for ARMM and other releases on top of the DPWH FY 2011 Budget. Moreover, a total of P20.265 Billion or P25.77% of the Capital Outlay under the DPWH FY 2012 Budget is programmed for Mindanao.

Investment Support Program for Autonomous Region for Muslim Mindanao (ARMM):

The National Government has prepared a Stimulus Development Plan for ARMM to implement the reform roadmap towards economic recovery and development. Under the plan, the Government will fund priority and strategic projects promoting basic services, basic infrastructure and livelihood development that have been identified by various national agencies. The development of national road infrastructure is one of the highlights of the Plan. The Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH), which has been designated as the lead agency to implement these projects, has created a Task Force to oversee its implementation. The amount of P2.851 Billion has been approved by the President and released by the Department of Budget and Management under SARO No. A-11-01651 dated 04 November 2011 for the rehabilitation, upgrading and improvement of various national roads and bridges in the following provinces covered by ARMM:

DPWH has successfully bid out the Daang Hari-South Luzon Expressway (SLEX) Link Road Project, in which the Ayala Corporation submitted the higher bid of P902 Million against the South Expresslink Consortium's P608 Million. The Daang Hari-SLEX Link Road Project is the first priority Public-Private Partnership (PPP) Project successfully bid out under the Aquino Administration. The contract will involve a 30-year operations and maintenance (O & M) concession period and a 16-month design and construction period within 2012 and 2013. Construction of the project's segments 1 and 2 will start in February 2012 and September 2012, respectively. The Notice of Award was issued to Ayala Corporation last December 22, 2011.




- Problem in site locations in many identified school districts such as land acquisition/ availability of land as school site





DPWH @ 113: KAISA SA TUWID NA DAAN SA PAG-ASENSO

Talumpati ng Kagalang-galang Benigno S. Aquino III, Pangulo ng Pilipinas, sa pagdiriwang ng ika-113 anibersaryo ng Department of Public Works and Highways (Inihayag sa DPWH Central, Bonifacio Drive, Port Area, Manila noong ika-23 ng Hunyo 2011)

Magandang umaga po sa inyong lahat, at happy anniversary po.

Madami akong gustong sabihin. Alam ninyo, matagal na ho akong hindi napunta dito sa DPWH. Simula po noong ako'y hindi ho binibigyan ng aking PDAF, para bang exercise in futility nalang ho pumunta dito. Ngayon ako na ho ang namimigay ng PDAF, kaya ok na rin po.

Can I just tell you a short story before I begin with the main speech? Noong ako po'y unang Congressman, kami po sa Tarlac ay marami hong problema, ang laki hong bahagi ng Manila North Road—noon ang MacArthur Highway—ang bumabaybay sa Tarlac City. At awa ng Diyos po, parang naging tradisyon na: kada tag-ulan, babahain 'yung junction papunta po doon sa kapilya ng Iglesia ni Cristo, at 'yung panganan naman pong diretsong MacArthur Highway. Babahain, linggo na ho ang pinag-usapan, maaraw na,

baha pa rin. So, iyong ating aspalto po—hot asphalt, 'di ho ba?—24 hours na nakababad, nalulusaw. Pag nalusaw, siyempre magiging baku-bako. Makikipaglaban ka, hahanap ka ng pondo: eventually, kukunin nila ang PDAF ko para pondohan ang national highway. Pagkatapos po noon, sa susunod na taon, ganoon nanaman ang proseso—hanggang dumating po ang isang mahusay na Regional Director, iyong yumaong si Mon Aquino, na inayos iyong aming Masalasa Creek, na kung saan talagang naibsan iyong pagbabaha.

Pero, kaya ko ho naikwento sa inyo ito: Kadalasan, pag tayo'y dumudunog sa ahensya ng gobyerno na may kakayahan para tugunan itong problemang ito, ang sasabihin sa atin, normally, umpisa, "wala po tayong pondo." Pag nakita na 'yung pondo, sasabihin sa iyo, "hihintayin ho nating umaraw." Pag dumating po ang araw, ilang buwan lang ang pinagusapan, balik nanaman tayo sa binaha, lumusaw at gumuhong kalsada. Siguro isa hong mabigat diyan, 'yung MacArthur Highway, a primary northern route outside of Metro Manila, ay nangangailangan pa ng overseas development assistance para ma-maintain.

Ang laki ng pinagkaiba ngayon. Kahapon po nasa Cotabato City kami. Sa Cotabato City, mayroon ho iyong watermaster. Isipin ninyo ang hyacinth, ano? Doon po ektaektarya ang lumulutang. Pag tayo iniisip natin ang water hyacinth—papunta doon iniisip ko parang water lily na tumatawid sa amin doon sa may Malacañang na medyo palutang-lutang, isang layer lang. Doon po, ang hyacinth tinatayuan ng tao, at iyong lupa po na naka-attach ay halos dalawang metro 'yung isang parte. Noong tinitibag nila, sabi ko, "grabe ito, ano?" Isipin ninyo, in effect, may isla na tumatakbo, na haharang doon




sa mga tulay—Delta Bridge ang pangalan ng isa. Bakit ko ho nakuwento ito?

Noong araw po sa Tarlac, noong rumaragasa ang tubig—sabi po kasi sa Tarlac, dalawa ho, talagang dry at saka wet months. Pag dry wala hong tumatakbong tubing doon sa Tarlac River. Pag wet months po, lahat naman ng hindi tumakbo noong dry months, miniminsanan; kaya ho talagang ginigiba lahat ng ating mga embankment na protection.

Doon ho, parang nasabi ng local government officials namin noong araw, "Wala tayong magagawa. Isa-Diyos na lang natin iyan, magdasal nalang tayo dito."

Dito po, nagdadasal pa rin kami, pero ang kinaganda po ng nandoon sa Cotabato City, ekta-ektarya nga 'yung katapat, natugunan po ng DPWH ang pakikipag-ugnayan sa atin pong Sandatahang Lakas, Kapulisan, at ng mga local government units. Doon po, naiibsan na 'yung problema, at hindi pinalala 'yung problema. Talagang ang layo na po ng kakayahan ng inyong tanggapan, at talaga naman pong tanda ng pamumuno ni Secretary Babes Singson—kaisa-isa pong kalalakihan ito na itinatawag kong "Babes," pero pag nakikita ko masaya ako parati. Puwede ho bang palakpakan natin ang atin pong Kalihim Babes Singson? [Applause] Sa totoo lang ho, mayroon kasing mga ibang miyembro ng Gabinete-mga dalawa, tatlo-kada makita ko, kaagad iniisip ko,





"ano kayang bad news ang dala-dala nito?" Pero si Secretary Babes Singson, si Secretary Mario Montejo, at marami pang iba; pati na si Secretary Abad: pag nakikita ko, kadalasan, solusyon ang tangan-tangan. Kaya naman pag humingi ng appointment, mabilis pa sa alas-kuwatro natin ina-approve iyan. Iyong iba ho, ipinipilit ko na lang po na harapin, dahil talagang, kako itong taong ito, talagang penitensya ko na yata sa mundong ito, kaya ok na lang.

Isang linggo mula ngayon ay ang unang taonnatinsapamamahala: angunang taonna pagtahak ng inyong bagong administrasyon sa tuwid na daan. Aminado tayong hindi naging madali ang mga pinagdaanan natin dito—may mga lubak ang lumang sistema na kinailangan nating patagin; may mga maya't maya ay nagbabato ng barikada upang sadya tayong harangin. Sa kabila nito, hindi tayo napagod na punan ang mga guwang na bulok ng kalakaran, at patuloy nating binabaklas ang anumang sagabal tungo sa tunay na reporma dahil alam nating ito ang matagal nang hiling ng taumbayan. Sa loob





lamang ng 12 buwan, matagumpay nating nailatag ang direksyon na babagtasin natin sa susunod pang limang taon. Ang nagdududa at naghahanap ng matibay na patunay sa ipinagmamalaki nating pagbabago, wala na nga po sigurong mas malinaw pang ehemplo dito kundi ang reporma sa Department of Public Works and Highways, na nagdiriwang ngayon ng ika-113 anibersaryo.


Sa pamumuno ng ating kalihim na si Babes Singson, ang dating imahen ng DPWH na pinuputakti ng mga kwestyonableng kontrata at sunod-sunod na katiwalian ay binuwag na natin. Tinapalan natin ang mga tagas ng palpak na budget, ginawa nating patas para sa lahat ang bidding ng mga proyekto, at binigyan ng mas matibay na pundasyon ang mga patakaran. Kaya naman ramdam ng maraming Pilipino, hindi lamang ang bunga ng mga reporma ng inyong ahensya, kundi maging ang panibagong sigla ng mga kawani ng DPWH—lalo na po iyong mga sumalubong sa akin kanina. Talagang masigla na ho kayo dito. Kung dati, ang tingin ng publiko sa mga binabakbak na daan ay gatasan lamang ng mga opisyal ng pamahalaan, ngayon, batid nilang ang bawat kalsadang sinisemento ay walang ibang ihahatid kundi ginhawa sa marami nating kababayan. Ang DPWH na dating nakalubog sa kumunoy ng korapsyon, komisyon, at iba pang anyo ng katiwalian ay siya ngayong pangunahing modelo ng tapat, tuwid at may malasakit na ahensya ng pamahalaan. Sana next year mas-mapuri ko kayo.

Tumatahak na nga po sa tuwid na daan ang inyong ahensya. Patunay dito ang pagbusisi ninyo sa 86 na kontratang nasa ilalim ng Post-Ondoy and Pepeng Short-Term Infrastructure Rehabilitation Project na may kabuuang halaga na 3.5 bilyong piso. Labing siyam po sa mga kontratang ito ay kinansela natin matapos nating maunakat na ilan sa mga ito ay pinalusot dahil sa mga politikal na kadahilanan at hindi talaga dumaan sa patas na bidding process.

Hindi lang ро mantakin po ninyo, nakalikom ang DPWH ng 2.12 bilyong piso mula sa kaban ng bayan mula Hulyo 2010 hanggang Abril 2011 dahil sa mahigpit na pagsunod sa mga public bidding rules. Muli, malaking halaga po ang naisalba natin mula sa kaban ng bayan—o para sa kaban ng bayan. At bago po matapos ang taong 2011, inaasahang ang kabuuang matitipid natin ay aabot sa humigitkumulang pitong bilyong piso, na maaaring pandagdag sa mga ipapatayo nating paaralan, at pagamutan. Wala pong duda na unti-unti nang nabubura ang madungis na reputasyong matagal nang pinapasan ng DPWH, at humahakbang na tayo tungo sa mas maaliwalas at tuwid na kabanata sa kasaysayan ng inyong ahensya.

Ang maganda pa nito, mulat ang DPWH na habang pumapasok tayo sa mas modernong panahon, kailangan din nating tugunan ang mga hinaing ng mga Pilipino sa mas makabagong paraan. Kaya naman ikinagagalak kong maging bahagi sa pagbubukas ng DPWH call center hotline (na tatawagan ko August 19). Ngayong may 165-02 hotline na ang DPWH na bukas beintekuwatro oras, isang tawag na lang ay maaari nang maipaabot ni Juan dela Cruz ang kaniyang mga hinaing o mungkahi sa DPWH. Sagisag itong palaging bukas ang inyong





ahensya sa anumang suhestiyon at reklamo na magbibigay-daan sa paghahatid ng mas mataas na kalidad ng serbisyo sa ating mga kababayan.

At kung serbisyo rin lang naman po ang pinag-uusapan, wala na po sigurong mas lilinaw pang halimbawa dito kundi ang mga DPWH retirees at loyalty awardees na pinaparangalan natin ngayong araw. ... Sila ay naging mahalagang bahagi ng DPWH, at harinawa'y kasabay ng pagbibigay-pugay at pasasalamat natin sa kanila ngayong umaga, ay ang intensiyon nating tapatan, kundi man higitan pa, ang serbisyong ginawa nila para sa DPWH.

Nagsusumikap ang inyong pamahalaan na maglatag ng reporma dahil, gaya ng mga pinaparangalan natin ngayon, nais din nating bumaba sa puwesto ng may dangal at may maipapamanang mabuting resulta sa mga susunod sa amin. Ginagamot natin ang mga sugat ng lumang sistema dahil ayaw nating ang mga proyektong bahagi ng DPWH master plan gaya ng Tarlac-Pangasinan-La Union Toll

expressway (o TPLEX), o ang Quezon Avenue Interchange Project, o ang Don Mariano Marcos Avenue Extension Project ay maging powerpoint presentation lamang, at hindi talaga maipatayo para mapakinabangan ng taumbayan.

Tayo rin naman po ang matatalo kung magpapahila parintayo satiwaling kalakaran. Talo ang mga magsasakang hindi maibenta ang kanilang ani dahil pagdating nila sa lungsod, lanta na ang kanilang mga paninda dahil sa haba ng lubak-lubak na kalsada. Talo ang mga estudyanteng lumulusong sa baha dahil may mga barado pa ring imburnal, sa kabila ng pondong matagal nang nailaan para kumpunihin ang mga ito. Talo tayo kapag may mga negosyanteng nadidismayang mamuhunan dito dahil bawat papeles na kailangan nilang papirmahan ay hinihingan ng pampadulas. May natitira pa po tayong limang taon sa puwesto, at huwag niyo naman po sanang hayaan na matalo lamang ang mga Pilipino dahil sa redtape, kurapsyon at panlalamana.

May lakas ng loob kaming tumaliwas sa bulok na sistema dahil alam naming ito ang tamang gawin, at ito ang inaasahan ng taumbayan sa atin. Hindi po kami magdadalawang-isip na tibagin ang mga dambuhalang pader na sumasagabal sa atin pong hangarin, basta lamang po matiyak nating sa isang liblib na lugar, may mga estudyanteng nakakapag-aral sa loob ng disenteng silid-aralan; basta lamang po ang mga mangingisdang nais maglako ng kanilang nakalap sa malalayong palengke ay may babagtasing patag at payapang kalsada.

Hindi ko po ito kakayaning gawin nang mag-isa. Kailangan ko po ang pakikiisa ng



DPWH tungo sa tuwid na daan. Hangga't nakatutok tayo sa kapakanan ng ating kapwa; hanggat tapat at isinasapuso natin ang paglilingkod natin sa ating bansa, tiyak pong mas magiging maaliwalas, maliwanag at matatag ang kalagayan ng Pilipinas na maipapamana natin sa susunod na salinlahi.

bago magtapos: ро ako magpapasalamat lang po iyong ating mga retirees sa kanilang tapat na serbisyo, at iyong atin naman pong mga awardees. Alam ho ninyo, noong isang araw nag-uusap ho kami ni Secretary Abad, at napaalala niya sa akin, para raw kami makatanggap ng pension, kailangan raw po kaming nagtrabaho sa gobyerno ng 20 years. Pagbaba ko po sa 2016, kakapusin po ako ng one year and a half. Sabi ko, "pati pala pension may discount na rin ngayon." Kaya, sa akin ho hindi ko puwedeng pakialamanan, at dapat naman hindi pakialamanan. Dahil, Secretary Singson, siguraduhin naman natin 'yung nararapat mga nagtrabaho nang tama at tuwid—ay maasikaso at maibigay sa kanila sa lalong madaling panahon.

Ulit, happy anniversary po. Maraming salamat po sa inyong lahat. Mabuhay ang DPWH!
